Dear Parents

You will receive alongside this newsletter a letter about the Building Works which will begin over the summer, and about Voluntary Contributions. Please can I urge you to read that letter: writing separately about those important issues allows me to be a little more reflective in this final newsletter of the year.

Much ink has been expended describing and trying to understand the last few momentous weeks in human history: it feels as though we inhabit a rather different world from the one we inhabited when I sent the last newsletter. There have been times when it has seemed that a wave of unpleasantness, divisiveness and violence has been unleashed across the globe with consequences that are destructive and depressing in the best cases, and horrific and death-dealing in the worst.

We need moral communities to carry us through times like these, and in my experience schools (and especially faith schools) provide some of the best models of this that we have. A community with 1300 people aged 11 to 70 in a confined space can only function if its members are daily exposed to explicit reminders of the rules and expectations. School students - more so than most adults - see day by day in so many small ways that good behaviour is rewarded and poor behaviour corrected. It is a stabilising and formative experience.

JCoSS has been a good place to be in these difficult times - and you may be interested to know that in the recent staff survey the behaviour of students has dropped way down the list of top causes of staff stress, compared to the equivalent time last year. We are never complacent but we feel that we are continuing to make quiet but marked progress in this area. I have to report that contact with parents retains its Number 1 slot in that chart for our middle leaders: we know it is the flip side of your passionate engagement with education, from which we hugely benefit, but you may like to reflect on that finding. We will run Parental and Student surveys in the new term so you can have your say at that point!

We bid farewell to a number of staff this term. Parents are often anxious about this, so you will be glad to know that this year sees the lowest percentage turnover since the school opened. Ms Miller - a founding member of the JCoSS staff - is retiring, Mr Macaulay is moving to a Head of Science post in Liverpool where his fiancé is based, Mr Simons leaves to explore new career paths in the Jewish community; Ms Goldstein-Opasiak has been appointed as Head of Art at Chancellors' School in Potters Bar, Ms Druckes as Head of DT at Lilian Baylis Technology School in South London, and Ms Coard to a post at Highlands School. Mr Lamont also heads south of the river to a new post at Graveney School. Ms Reidy and Ms Caplin are off to teach in Dubai, Ms Brady to the United Arab Emirates and Ms Walsh to the Irish Republic; Mr Moses goes to a Maths position at Yavneh College, and Mrs Airey to be Head of Drama at Immanuel College. Rabbi Nevo ends her short stay with us in Jewish Education, and Mr Jesner ends his time running the Beit Midrash programme to devote more time to his psychotherapeutic practice - perhaps not the most frequently-heard destination for departing teachers.

Among the Support Staff we say good bye to Mrs Rosenberg (who is retiring) and to Ms Kings, Ms Snower, Miss Yadlin, Mrs Friedgood, Ms Bilbija, Mr Lewis, Ms Matesanz, Ms Anders, Mr Griffin and Mr Ivanov. These members of the Learning Support team may be less widely known than our leaving teachers, but their impact on individual students and smaller groups has been profound.

We wish all these colleagues every success in their future careers, and thank them whole-heartedly for their contributions to JCoSS over the years. Parents and students will be glad to know that we are fully and impressively staffed for September; newly qualified staff have spent the last 3 weeks of term with us, and all new joiners spent a day here at the beginning of July so they are already familiar with the JCoSS ethos which attracts such high quality staff and ensures continuity of education for your sons and daughters.

Lastly, we send best wishes to Mrs Dar-el, Ms Foster and Mrs Irrgang who will be on maternity leave at the beginning of next year but who we expect will rejoin us not too long afterwards.

I will end this long (and latterly hot) term by sending my very best wishes for the summer to the whole JCoSS community: may it be a time of restoration and re-creation for us all.

A group of sixteen Y8 students have been working with the educational charity, Jewish Interactive and the National Library of Israel in support of the Jewish history unit that they have been studying this year. During these workshops, students accessed resources from the late 19th and early 20th century in order to create a multimedia resource.

With the help of Anat Goodman, Director of Educational Technology at Jewish Interactive (and a JCoSS parent) students created their own virtual characters to explain Theodore Herzl's views and reasons for the development of Zionism. Daniel Garai Ebner said "The process has been really interesting and we used iPads to do our research. I've enjoyed developing my own characters and using the applications and feel that I could use these skills in my other subjects too."

After that, each school group gave a presentation on one of the shortlisted novels; it was fascinating to see which aspects of each book the groups focused on and the original, creative ways that they found to communicate their thoughts.

There was an opportunity to discuss, in groups, each of the shortlisted books and finally, we were each invited to cast our vote for the winning book. The Barnet winner turned out to be Lies We Tell Ourselves by Robin Talley. It was very exciting to be able to spend a whole day thinking about and discussing great books and to have a say in determining the winner of such a prestigious national prize.
