Dear Parents

If you have not already done so, I am sorry to say that you have just missed the chance to see the wonderful production of The Pianist of Willesden Lane which closes tomorrow. Those of you who managed to see it will I think agree that it was a remarkable phenomenon: a tour de force one-woman show in its own right and all the more so because of the story it told, the person who told it, and the context in which it is heard. Mona Golabek is not trained as an actor but as a pianist: she plays her own mother Lisa Jura — also a pianist — in telling an extraordinarily moving survival story, bittersweet but ultimately hopeful. Lisa came to London on the Kindertransport and survived the many vicissitudes of the war years, separated from her family, to become the concert pianist that her family always hoped she could.

Three things gave the show huge power for me: first, precisely because it was performed by someone not trained in acting, it had a fresh and compelling authenticity that spoke to the heart. Second, the twists and turns of the story were mirrored and intensified by exquisite piano playing – all done by the same one woman – so that music and words embraced each other almost in a dance. Third, the context of today's political realities was unspoken but palpably in the auditorium with us: Mona Golabek's gratitude to the British people for their hospitality in accepting refugee children, on her own account and on behalf of her mother, was explicit. There was no edge or self-pity, but as I watched I felt ashamed of the contrast to this week's calls for dental records to be checked before just 14 refugee children from the Calais "Jungle" could be accepted into the UK.

Of course there are complexities and political realities to acknowledge and the two situations are not straightforwardly comparable, but the anti-foreigner rhetoric that seems to have gained in confidence and respectability this year really troubles me. The Pianist of Willesden Lane reveals it as profoundly un-British, dare one say unpatriotic, and for so many reasons it feels deeply at odds with the JCoSS project. Our students are, after all, largely the grandchildren of rootless refugees: as the Union Jack and Israeli Flag standing side by side in the Heart Space remind us each day, we stand as a symbol of the desire to connect up the deep resources of Jewish tradition to the challenges and opportunities of the modern world. Our whole ethos is one of mutual welcome — and it feels to me that there has never been a more urgent need to affirm and shout about that.

What better time to do so than during Sukkot which speaks on the one hand of Jewish hospitality, and on the other of the Jewish experience of being nomadic, living in makeshift accommodation, so often strangers in an alien land. There's an irony that the JCoSS sukkah is a permanent, well-built and substantial structure of wood, but the point is the same, and that point is I think a universal one: all human societies do well to see themselves as temporary, makeshift and provisional. It stops us taking ourselves too seriously, it encourages generosity, open-heartedness and open-mindedness, and it reminds us that ultimate value is not be found in human constructs and institutions, but somewhere less tangible yet ultimately more durable.

Perhaps we are all like the music played by the Pianist of Willesden Lane – exquisite, fleeting, shaped by our narratives yet free from them, dancing with our circumstances but always yearning for something more lasting, and with the potential to unite and inspire others and awaken their true beauty and worth.

The plan is for the production to return to the UK in the future as a multi-layered learning project – if so, JCoSS will certainly be first in the queue to take part.

IJE NEWS

School charities: The year has started with the launch of this year's school charities, as voted by students last year. The charities are The Lemonade Fund, a small charity in Israel (under the umbrella of the My Israel charity), which financially supports needy breast cancer patients; Tzedek, which supports projects in the developing world and educates on world poverty through a Jewish lens; and Max's Foundation, set up in memory of Max Schiller, brother of Molly in Year 13, who tragically died in 2014, which is dedicated to helping detection of hypertrophic cardiomyopathy and other heart conditions in pre-adolescent children.

We are delighted that this year's charities are all small grassroots operations where our contributions will make a big impact. Throughout the year, different year groups will focus on raising money for the different charities and we will be rewarding the form and the house who are able to raise the largest amounts of money.

Shana Tova: This year Rosh Hashana was celebrated in school with a sale of locally produced organic honey and home grown veggies from the JCoSS garden as well as other New Year activities including a New Year greetings photo booth, a tzitzit making workshop and another opportunity to send 'sorry' cards to friends and colleagues at school.

Volunteering and leadership: Years 7, 8 and 9 are once again invited to take part in the Yoni Jesner Awards this year, for which we are looking for students to



give a minimum of 20 hours of volunteering over the year. Year 8 will continue our innovative volunteering programme, visiting Southgate Connect (Jewish Care) or Livingstone Primary at least once during the year. There are plenty of other opportunities both in and beyond school and all students are encouraged to see Mr Rosenberg in IJE to sign up.

Year 10 are also invited to apply for the Alan Senitt Leadership programme which will run again this year. This interfaith programme offers leadership training seminars with students from a wide range of other schools and the opportunity for students to work on a piece of community-based social action.

Lunchtime Clubs: We are delighted to launch the Gemara Lunch club for those students who want to stretch themselves and develop their skills around learning Gemara with Rabbi Zinkin. This is in addition to the Israel club which is run by May, our Israeli Scout who is spending the year volunteering at JCoSS before going to do her Army service in Israel. And of course our hugely successful Manna from Heaven programme continues to make treats for the users of the Homeless Action Barnet day centre. Look out for Jewish Film Club launching after half term.

Israel Journey: Applications are open for the Year 9 Israel Journey which will take place from 11 – 23rd June 2017. This amazing and innovative trip is a flagship JCoSS programme and we are looking forward to an another successful year.

Save the Date: Parents' Trip to Poland: Now in its 3rd year, this unique programme offers JCoSS parents and other family members over the age of 18 to have a taster of the experience of the 6th form Poland Journey. Visiting Krakow and Auschwitz over a 48 hour period offers the opportunity to benefit from a similar educational experience to the 6th formers in a small and like-minded group. Parents Needed for JCoSS Careers Workshop

The **Careers Workshop** takes place early in the day on **November 30** (8.30am) and is designed to help students nearing the end of their time at school with the important career and Higher Education decisions they will soon be making.

A poll of this cohort of students identified the following career areas as those they particularly wanted to hear more about:

Law, Medicine, Accountancy/Finance, Creative Arts, Media, Computer Science and Psychology.

Parents are asked to prepare a talk lasting 15 minutes covering how and why they chose their job, qualifications and training needed, what they do on a typical day, skills/qualities required, what they like best/don't like about their work and any tips on what students can do now to increase their chances of getting into those careers.
