

Dear Parents,

The transition from pandemic to endemic has been much heralded in the last few days, and we are relived at last to see the first fruits of falling case numbers at JCoSS: as the green shoots of Spring 2022 start to peep out from the cold, hard earth, so too will our students' faces from behind their masks after so many months of restrictions. It is time to breathe a little more easily (a point that will not be lost on fellow glasses-wearers...).

If it's not a little downbeat to say so, Covid's departure from centre stage allows us to remember that other problems demand our attention too, perhaps the most urgent of which is the Climate Crisis. JCoSS has been brilliantly and consistently led in this area by our students. In 2019 we gave a challenge to those who, pre-pandemic, were asking to join protest marches and school strikes: how can you help the issue gain traction within our school, so that we 'think global, act local' in this most pressing area of behaviour?

The result was the Climate Declaration made – with full support from the School and Governors – by Ruben Persey (Y13), as featured in the earliest entry of this Social Media round-up. It also attracted more conventional media attention and will, we hope, be a beacon to others and encourage links with other schools and communities. Students have ensured succession in their leadership of this important work, and Governors have asked for metrics against which they can measure our progress.

Climate as a term is relevant not only in meteorology but in human community too: the climate of an organisation refers to its emotional atmosphere, its typical culture, the lived experience being in it, and this is a something we try hard to attend to as a school. There are ways in which we want it to change – and our older students have continued to be superb guides (and teachers of younger peers) as we continue to reflect on the issues raised last year by Everyone's Invited.

But – just as in the natural world – there are many other ways in which we want to preserve the distinct climate which prevails at JCoSS and which upholds its beautiful and diverse ecosystem. It has been a great joy to return to so many activities that we have missed, from the solemnity of Holocaust Remembrance to the creative exuberance of Enrichment Day, from the intellectual fizz of Year 9 Number Day to the quirky musical genius of the Classics Department during Classics Week. As several colleagues have said (or at least implied...): we are getting our mojo back!

Climate, they say, is what you expect, whereas weather is what you get. The 'weather' of JCoSS has frequently been overcast over the past two years of closures, restrictions and endless change: at times we have simultaneously had high pressure, storms and deep depressions. But the underlying climate, I believe, remains healthy and life-sustaining.

We weep with those who weep – which continues, despite the triumphant headlines about an end to the pandemic: members of the community are still suffering from Covid itself, and even more from the shadow it has cast over emotional wellbeing and academic confidence. But we laugh too with those who laugh, and it has been such a tonic to have more of that as meetings are once again face-to-face, and as more of those faces are visible so that we can read each other better.

I wish you a good half term holiday (my first in 18 months...) and we look forward to lengthening days and broadening smiles (not forgetting Purim on 17 March) in the weeks ahead.
