Dear Parents

Just as we are beginning to get into a rhythm after the festivals, along comes half term...and yet despite numerous holidays since September, a week off still seems more than welcome. The Almighty did not of course consult with UK schools when planning the chagim at the dawn of time itself, so we can only joyfully submit to the eternal divine wisdom (and may I at this point issue another reminder to check the dates of our Pesach holiday before booking any trips for Spring 2016?).

With each year that passes, the school feels more fully itself and it has been very satisfying, at the various Open Events for prospective students this term, to be able to show real results rather than simply asking parents to trust us. Since all of you reading this newsletter did act on that trust alone, now seems a good time to thank you for doing so, and for joining the wonderful project that JCoSS continues to be. Presenting the school to outsiders is one of the joys of my role: the combination of aspiration and welcome, of deeply rooted and open-hearted Judaism, is one that is easy to communicate and finds ready acceptance among parents, occasionally to their slight surprise.

Our aim as an institution has always been to help shape a more united Jewish community for the future. Where there are two Jews, of course, there are at least three opinions. But I heard an addition to this quip at a poignant and moving occasion this week: there may be three opinions, but there is a single beating heart, and one that needs to be nurtured. The speaker was Bat-Galim Sha'ar, the mother of one of the Israeli teenagers whose kidnap and murder sparked the horrors of last summer's violence.

The occasion was a small gathering from right across the Jewish community at the home of Lord Sacks the former Chief Rabbi, arranged by the Israeli cross-communal organisation Gesher (the word means 'bridge'). Bat-Galim spoke with enormous dignity and passion of her experiences – both the agony of losing her son and the immense outpouring of support that followed it and buoyed her family through the darkness. It gave her a powerful sense of the unity of the Jewish people in times of adversity, and her prayer is that such unity might be strengthened in other times too.

Lord Sacks introduced her with the observation that the Jewish people have survived attacks by every major world civilisation over 5,000 years, and that the only thing that could destroy the community its own internal conflicts. We do not have to agree, the message was, but we do need to care for each other. These are values that are central to JCoSS, and we know that the commitment to those values is very strong amongst students, parents, staff and beyond.

Sociologists point out the difference, however, between *espoused values* (the ones we profess to hold) and *operative values* (the ones that we actually live out) and there is no place for smugness in the JCoSS community. I have reminded students in a podcast this week of the need to live out the welcome and mutual concern that we profess in the day-to-day business of school life. To use my particular examples, that means clearing up our own (and if necessary others') litter, and it means treating visiting supply staff with the same courtesy and consideration that our students routinely show to staff they know.

The most important slide of my Open Day presentation — as I say every time — is the one about our core purpose of building mensches. Get that right and the rest will follow, we have said for 5 years. Even now that the rest has emphatically followed, we need to hold fast to that core purpose and be sure to live it out at all levels of the school as best we can.

With best wishes for (yet another) holiday and for the rest of the term ahead.

Careers Mentoring Programme

Year 12 students could find themselves watching a surgeon perform in an operating theatre or sitting in on high-level client meetings with a top law firm, by signing up to the Jewish mentoring programme organised by JUMP-ORT. The organisation's co-ordinator, Mia Lyons, was at JCoSS earlier this month to introduce students to the programme, which provides mentors across a wide range of careers including medicine, music technology, engineering, media and law.

Mentors, many of whom are in high-profile positions within their careers, offer their time on a voluntarily basis. They spend five hour-long sessions with students in their workplace during the academic year and the relationship has led to a number of students finding their first job after university with the employer who mentored them. Mentors talk to students about their careers and arrange for them to get first-hand insights into their day to day work.

"Even if we don't have a mentor on our list in an area the student wants to work in, we will try to find someone", explained Mrs Lyons. "All students need is a commitment to get the most out of the programme."

The programme is ideal for students who already have an idea about what career they want to pursue and provides excellent material when it comes to writing the Personal Statement section of university applications.

Indeed, one of the mentoring sessions focuses on just that.

Please remember that with effect from Friday 6th November and each subsequent Friday, up to and including, Friday 15th April, school will close at 1.30pm.


