

Dear Parents

The Newsletter comes out slightly later than usual which allows to include not only some news of recent successes, but also to provide latest news in some constantly changing situations. In the pages which follow, along with articles on numerous events and initiatives at JCoSS, we include the formal announcement of our new Senior Student Leadership Team, and the exciting news that for the second year running JCoSS has scooped 2 awards of the 4 available for secondary schools at the PaJeS Jewish Schools Awards. Ms Moses won in the 'Emerging Teacher' category, and Ms Robinson won in the 'Deputy/Assistant Head' category. We are delighted by their success, proud of Mrs Lethbridge for making the shortlist in the SEN category, and proud too of the many JCoSS staff who were nominated in all categories. Thank you to all who have joined in the spirit of these awards at which JCoSS so fulsomely represented.

I am grateful too to all parents who have responded to the Curriculum and School Day consultation. The clear majority were in favour of most or all of the changes but (of course!) many excellent and pertinent points were made which we are now considering as we decide the final shape of the curriculum. We hope to publish this in the next couple of weeks. Some respondents asked for clarification on media reports of expansion at JCoSS and I will now take this opportunity to do so.

You will all be aware of the shortage of places at Jewish schools for the numbers of children who want them. The problem has been growing in recent years, with demand outstripping supply by about 30 places, which led Yavneh College to offer additional places last year. JCoSS will this week offer 210 places (rather than the usual 180) to children in the current Year 6, which means that there are enough places across the community's schools for all who are expected to want one. We have been able to include these offers in the normal admissions process which means that parents' preferences can be fully taken into account and that the extra places go to the record number who have put JCoSS as first preference. The school building is of course busy and full already, but we are able to accommodate these extra students by keeping the portacabins for a little longer, in addition to the new classrooms under construction in Wing D. We will also of course recruit the additional staffing required too, and existing students need have no fears for the quality of their own education.

The picture from 2018 is more complicated, but we are playing our part in discussions about how to meet future demand. We know that the current uncertainty is agonising for the parents of primary school children, and we take seriously our duty to the community which has bought into the JCoSS vision so generously. You can be confident that we will weigh it all up with the best interests of our students and families at heart, and we will make a success of whatever transpires.

He started his own business at the age of 24, founded the foreign exchange company Travelex, and among other things, is currently Deputy Chairman of the Community Security Trust. He spoke about working his way up in the business world and gave us advice on how to tackle the challenges that he overcame in his line of work, advice that was certainly welcomed by the future entrepreneurs among us.

Mr Dorfman's key, overarching message was the importance of change in business, and learning to adapt and take advantage of the constantly changing markets and the new technology and opportunities that we are lucky enough to have access to. He explained that obstacles will be inevitable but persistence and taking risks are the key to success. As one of JCoSS's original donors, Mr Dorfman stressed the significance of giving back to the community, aiding others to start up their own projects through whatever means possible. On behalf of the Sixth Form, we were all grateful to welcome such a distinguished guest into our school and to listen to his engaging talk, which definitely gave us valuable advice for the future.
