Dear Parents

Aside from being the end of what feels like (but isn't) a long half term, 14 February has some well-known resonances. The Feast of St Valentine (not celebrated in any Church that I know) is perhaps 90% legend to 10% fact, and there is little to connect this obscure martyr from Roman times to the outpouring of consumerist romantic fantasy that fills the shops today. But if love is in the air that can't be a bad thing.

What I recall on St Valentine's Day (you'll have to forgive the "St" – I'm a bit of a stickler) is an assembly given by a former colleague, who said that it was always the day when she noticed it was still light when she left school at 5.30. They presented with style and confidence at a glitzy gathering of the great and the good of Jewish Education at Kinloss Synagogue on Tuesday, outlining their idea for a Japanese Garden to promote wellbeing and the environment at JCoSS.

Although the Secondary School winners were a team from Kantor King Solomon the sponsors of the competition, the Wolfson Foundation, decided to fund all the shortlisted proposals.

That means that the girls have secured a donation of £8,000 to bring this project to life! We hope it will take shape in the courtyard of the Dorfman Wing, bringing a focus of greenery and calm to the 2nd floor of Wing D...and bringing another kind of love in the air!

We congratulate them both hugely – offering thanks too to Ms Raven who has coaxed and coached them throughout the process.

Love is, of course, a many-splendoured thing and comes in numerous forms – pragmatic, romantic, erotic, friendly, materialistic, self-giving...while the love of neighbour and of God are cornerstones of the Biblical commandments. It's a word I often use as I describe and commend JCoSS to others – and deliberately so, even though it risks sounding soppy. If love means practical actions that manifest a deep commitment, then that is what my colleagues offer day in day out, to deserving and less deserving alike. I think it is a word that encapsulates what makes this place special – for all the things we may not get right – and it's not something that you feel in other schools in the same way. It's probably not something that all Headteachers would admit to feeling about their schools...but there it is!

Year 10 Morrisby Career Meetings Underway

The annual programme of career meetings organised with every Year 10 student has now started and will run until the end of the year.


The meetings follow the completion of Morrisby psychometric assessments with the whole year group, last term. The Morrisby assessment is well known in the independent sector and JCoSS is one of the few state schools in the country to deliver it free of charge for every Year 10 student. We have been running it for several years now and believe it is a really positive addition to the way we support your children in their career thinking.

It measures verbal, numerical, abstract, spatial and mechanical abilities and requires students to complete a career interests questionnaire. Together, these enable Morrisby to create an in-depth profile report of each student; what they like and where their talents and aspirations lie, the nature of their personality and their employment preferences.

This year for the first time we are adding the notes from our career meetings with students, including advice on what to do now to further their career ideas, to the on-line report. To view the notes, students will need to access their report by logging on to their Morrisby account. Please ask them about this and ensure they can log in. If they can't remember their details please tell them to come to the Careers Office and we will help them set up a new log-in.

We want to ensure your child gets the most out of their Morrisby assessment. There is a lot to it and sharing the report with you will help them do this. We are sure you will find it interesting reading, if you haven't already seen it.

The report includes an interactive tool which allows students to investigate different career options and start to understand the educational pathways that are involved. This can help students make decisions about post 16 choices including A levels, Cambridge Technicals, apprenticeships, and further and higher education.



All the Morrisby log-ins are 'for life', so students can re-visit the Morrisby website throughout their educational and working lives, updating their career interests as they develop, to seek out

It's been a while since you have heard from us, so this month's article is an 'Eco-Takeover!'

The JCoSS Eco-Warriors have been ever so busy, which has included attending Parliament to lobby the local Barnet MP Rt Hon Theresa Villiers. The Eco-Warriors had a great Q&A session sharing JCoSS' ECo past achievements and future initiatives, with Theresa Villiers, stating she will return to JCoSS to listen and provide support to schools' Eco concerns.

The recent General Election generated much debate, so Miss Bossman organised an 'Eco Warriors' JCoSS meeting where the Student Voice Team, Sixth Form Politics students, Jewish Education A'Level students, pro-environmentalist members of staff and our Site Manager discussed JCoSS policies. Our conclusion to the meeting was that the Government needed to support local authorities to supply the right resources for our school in order for us to be more sustainable.

The JCoSS Eco-Warriors have continued to collect bottles in and around the school site, as well as keeping audits and carrying out surveys. The Catering Team shared their exciting news that the number of plastic bottles purchased has decreased. This has been helped by the installation of water stations enabling more students to refill their water bottles throughout the school day. We also now have recyclable colour coded meal containers in the Canteen, wooden cutlery and designated recycling bins within the heart space.

Another initiative we are driving forward is for the school to reduce its carbon footprint. The Eco-Warriors will continue their conversations with our Head Teacher to apply for the Eco Schools Secondary Pathway and we will report back later this year.

The JCoSS Eco-Warriors have established a committee who meet on a weekly basis on Thursday lunchtimes, who focus on improving environmental awareness in school by promoting the 3R's – Reduce Reuse and Recycle. Our vision is for JCoSS to become a certified sustainable school and teach the nature of how we as a society take care of our planet more effectively.

Last week, the whole school listened to a talk by Liz Bonnin, an experienced environmentalist and were able to ask some impactful environmental questions. A massive thanks to the Head Student Committee for organising the event.

On behalf of all the JCoSS ECo Warriors, we thank you for your support and embracing our ideas to make the school sustainable. The last few years have been super and we believe the JCoSS community and our menschlikiet ways will make a big lasting ecological positive impact on our planet.

PSRP Employability Programme

Hi, my name is Andrew Ellul and I am in Year 12 in the PSRP. I am writing this article to tell you about the amazing things we do in our Employability lessons in the PSRP and outside of school.

We have been on a number of trips where we carry out jobs to support the places we are visiting. For example, we go every week to Aldenham Country Park where we help the staff clean out the pens, clean the hay, fix things that are broken, clean the eggs ready to be sold in the shop and make the feed bags for the public to buy to feed the animals. We have weekly meetings with the staff from Aldenham which helps us to learn how to work as part of a working team. We also go to Learn 2 Listen in Hertfordshire, where we work with the horses, groom them, go out for rides and learn about health and safety. We have also been given opportunities like working at Protocol Education Agency, visiting Lady Sarah Cohen Care Home and playing games with the residents and we have worked alongside Norwood in their shops and offices.

In the PSRP, we are very lucky to have a Work Related Learning room where we complete jobs that are given to us by all staff members. These jobs include, telephone calls, photocopying, laminating, shredding and making deliveries. These are all tasks that will help us to improve our work skills for when we leave JCoSS. One of the major work related learning jobs I am currently doing is a PSRP site inspection with a member of the PSRP staff and together we are making a list of all the minor repairs that need to be dealt with. We are also liaising with the site team and PSRP staff.

Last year, one of my peers designed a Holiday Greetings card and we sold them in the PSRP and managed to raise over £100.00 for charity.

I have passed my level 2 health and food safety certificate which has given me the opportunity to work on a daily basis in the JCoSS 6th form kitchen and café. I help with the preparation of the bagels, paninis and pizzas. As part of this role, I did a survey of 6th form students in the common room about the fillings and toppings they would like to see as new things for sale in the café. After the survey, I made a list of all the new fillings and spoke to the head of the catering staff. I was really happy when I saw a few weeks later that one of my suggestions being served in the café. Serving in the café also helps me talk to my peers and teaches me how to give good customer service to all the people who visit the café.

I also have been mentoring the younger year groups in the PSRP and this helps me and them with their team building and gives me more experience.

All these employability skills I am learning now, will help me when I leave JCoSS and are teaching me new skills every day.
