

Have you ever heard of "the popular kids"? You may recall the type from your own school days: happy, often sporty, good at lots of things and relaxed about the things they aren't good at; confident, surrounded by friends both in real life and on social media; worry-free, they seem to navigate life with ease. They are life's winners...or so it seems.

Over my time as both parent and teacher, I've heard plenty about these "popular kids", but I have questions. Above all, I've never met someone who thinks they are one. No surprise, of course that no one admits to the less attractive traits that sometimes come with this kind of "popularity", but no one admits, either, to being an effortless winner, confident, relaxed and worry-free. How can we explain this?

Perhaps these "popular kids" are so unself-aware that they have no idea what they are like – good or bad. But I'm inclined towards a second option, which is that they don't really exist. They are a projection of our collective neurosis, based in experience perhaps, that we imagine into being and then beat ourselves up with. Because we feel inadequate, we imagine that others thinking it of us and forcing us to that view.

I don't think it's just a school phenomenon. These imagined "popular kids" grow into adults who say – or so we fear – things like "I'm living my best life", or "We're living the dream". The pictures of their perfect lives on social media fuel the 'impostor syndrome' that dogs many adults, (especially women) so that whatever jobs or successes we land we always feel we don't quite deserve them. Scratch the surface, though, and I wonder how many people are really like this.

I confessed to a friend recently my sense that other people 'know how to live' more happily and easily than I do. He pointed out that as head of a successful school, with a side-hustle as a priest in a flourishing church, kids who've got through university, etc etc, I have a life that others probably look on with envy. Even my life — imperfect, embarrassing, conflicted, frustrating as I know it is. Fair point...and if so, perhaps we all need to be rather gentler on each other and on ourselves. The "popular kids" that your child may be wary of are probably feeling just as wary too.

If this is a collective neurosis, then we need to help each other, and our children, to manage it. I had a go in today's Final Assembly. The good news, I suggested, is simply that realisation that everyone has self-doubt and everyone thinks other people are more successful and together and happy than they are. It's probably a universal human trait, and it could be that those who make the most noise and look the most flashy are the ones who are most worried – if so, a little compassion is called for. It's definitely wise to assume that whatever we think we see is not the whole story.

As we know, but are prone to forget, those who make no mistakes rarely make anything at all, and perfection is a burden that saps creativity. It's normal and necessary to bumble, to fall short, to foul some things up completely. We might admit, too, that the culture we live in is, frankly, a bit weird. Great for freedom, sparkle, self-expression and convenience (for those with the money to afford it), but not so great for those who are quieter, more reflective and self-critical...or want to live more simply. If we can't see the weirdness, we may need to look more carefully. In the end there's no correlation between being "popular" and being popular – liked and respected by others, known for kindness and integrity, appreciated for honesty and self-awareness. Those are the qualities that last. They're also what we call 'being a Mensch'. I hope the summer holiday is an opportunity to cultivate them.
